Many Americans associate Islam with figures such as Osama bin Laden, and they worry about “ homegrown terrorists. ” To shed light on this increasingly important religious group and counter mutual distrust, renowned scholar Akbar Ahmed conducted the most comprehensive study to

date of the American Muslim community. Journey into America explores and documents how Muslims are fitting into U.S. society, placing their experience within the larger context of American identity.
